The Present Situation and the Subjects of Public Investment in Land Infrastructure

This paper surveys and deals with the outlook of public investment in agricultural land infrastructure in Hokkaido which has contributed to higher agricultural productivity. The public investment share in the upland farming area has increased recently and the share of investment for public facilities such as drainage for daily living, rural road and community center has increased to more than fifty percent of total public investment. The environmental factor in rural development has become a more important issue. It is necessary to have a new national criterion for rural public investment based on regional demand to improve the economic situation of rural areas.

The Effect of Irrigation and Drainage Projects on Agricultural Development in Furano City.

This paper attempts to investigate the effect of irrigation and drainage projects on the process of rural agricultural development in Furano City, Hokkaido.

Irrigation and drainage projects are main factors in the process of rural agricultural development, but their enforcement is not a sufficient condition.

From the experience in Furano City, farmer's organizations to produce and sell vegetables and regional facilities for vegetable storage improvement also played very important roles.

The Farmer's Repayment Ability for Agricultural Land Improvement

The cost of agricultural land improvement investment has increased rapidly and the farmer's ability to repay has become an important economic problem. The postponing of project completion due to the change in the agricultural economic situation, the high standard of construction specifications and investment in less favorable agricultural areas are reasons for the increase in cost. Although special financial loans were given to farmers to reduce farmer's burden, other counterpolicies are needed to give incentive for land improvement to farmers.

Regional Resource Management and Social Capital — the California Water Pricing Policy —

Public investment in irrigation project has contributed to the growth of California agriculture. This paper attempted to clarify the water pricing policy of the federal and state irrigation projects, which has been controversial for a long time. The policy implications of the California experience for Japanese public investment for land improvement projects were also discussed : (1) the difficulty of getting consensus to accept the public investment projects among farmers; (2) the ambiguous contract between the farmers and the public sector ; and (3) the restrictive substitutable crops which make inefficient resource use.
